#### Location, Facilities and Parking

Location: Point Loma Nazarene University (PLNU), 3900 Lomaland Drive, San Diego, CA 92106.

**Driving Directions:** Go West on I-8 (toward beaches), turn left onto Nimitz Blvd, turn right onto Chatsworth Blvd, turn left onto Catalina Blvd. Turn right onto Lomaland Drive and continue through the security gate to PLNU.

Accessibility Classes are located in several buildings, including Bond, Evans, Ryan and Taylor. Each classroom is easily accessible to another within the 15 minutes allotted between classes, but be prepared to travel between buildings as your day progresses. We have done our best to minimize travel times but do understand part of the "fellowship" of the University of Scouting is meeting others during classroom changes! #### **Check-in and Materials Pickup Location**

All participants and staff need to check in on arrival, just follow the signs to the <u>check-in table at Salomon Theatre</u>. You will be given a materials packet that contains a room schedule, evaluation form, lunch ticket, and other items. Bring your own class schedule. Please keep all of your materials with you throughout the day.

#### Lunch

A wonderful buffet lunch will be served in Nicholson Commons and it is included in your fee. Please do not lose your lunch ticket, as you will need it to obtain lunch in the Commons. The cafeteria typically provides a wide variety of foods. On campus: At the first stop sign, take left turn toward the Main Campus. At the next stop sign, turn left toward the Parking Structure. At Ryan Learning Center, turn left into the parking garage. After parking, follow the signs leading to <u>check-in</u>.

#### Can I Earn a Degree?

With the exception of Commissioners, there is no BSA National curriculum or standard that supports an "official" degree in the University; however, all participants will receive a SDIC "Degree in Scouting" that is awarded based solely on attendance. To receive credit towards a Commissioner Science degree, participants must send proof of attendance to the Assistant Council Commissioner for Training.

#### **Code of Conduct**

All participants and staff are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with the principles in the Scout Oath and Law. Tobacco, alcohol and use of illegal drugs are strictly forbidden. Although PLNU will not be in full session please understand their faculty and students will still be in the area and that we are guests and would like to be welcomed back next year. Scouts (and Scouters) always leave their environment better than they found it and we encourage everyone to clean up after themselves and others. Keep in mind Outdoor Ethics and Leave no trace!
